A MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD

Dear Parents/Carers,

It has been a very busy end to the Summer term for all at Dormers Wells. I would like to thank our amazing staff team who work tirelessly for your children, in an environment where teachers and schools are responsible for much more.

Summer Fair Fundraising

This year the children and some parents in the Infants enjoyed having the Little Circus (Circus Pazzaz) who put on a spectacular performance and kept everyone well entertained. The children and staff with the help of a few parents worked hard to make the day a success and managed to raise £2290.77 (a similar amount to last year). We still have a few ice lollies left to be sold, which would add a few more pounds to our enterprise pot. This money would enable us to buy vital resources for the children, such as playground equipment and books and subsidise trips. It takes a huge amount of planning, preparation and dedication to bring so many families together to fundraise for our school. We are very grateful to everyone who donated, spent on our stalls and dedicated their time to make this an enjoyable occasion.

Achievements

Pupils have now brought home their end of year reports. We hope the general comments, written by your child's class teacher will help you to know where your child has been successful, as well as providing further targets for pupils to work on as they prepare for their new year or for a new phase of education. We are also pleased to share with parents, that our pupils did well this year in national statutory assessments in the following year groups: • Year 1 Phonics • Year 4 MTC • Year 6 SATs

We are pleased with the academic achievements of all our pupils this year, including our Year 6 SATs results published last week, where our pupils were above National and improved from last year, in all areas except Maths/Combined.

These results are testament to the good teaching across the school and the broad and balanced curriculum we offer, not to mention the hard work our Year 6 pupils have put in to gain such good results, to take up to high school. This year group were impacted by COVID, as in the years 2019-2020, and 2020-21, there were in Year 1 and 2 and were not invited into school during any lockdown.

Our results largely are above the provisional published national average. We are thrilled with these strong outcomes, particularly high for Writing; showing the impact of our targeted teaching, intervention and support. Well done team and thank you to parents, for your support. Our Year 6 pupils are more than ready to take their talents and achievements to their new schools and we are very proud of them! We know that successes are not only academic and it has been lovely to read in the Year 6 Yearbook/Leavers Assembly Presentation, some of the highlights of their time at Dormers Wells.

TFL Travel Award

We are proud to announce we have managed to maintain our Gold Award for our TFL sustainable travel in school. LOOK OUT FOR OUR BANNER! The children have engaged in lots of activities and competitions around travel this year and the past two years which contributed to the success. However, Our work is not done as we set ourselves some high targets for the new academic year:

- 1. To reduce school traffic and the illegal parking of parents to ensure that ALL pupils are kept safe coming into school or when leaving school.
- 2. Pupil Voice ensuring the TFL Explorers are able to engage in Travel assemblies and run more competitions for children around travel.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PRIORITIES: THERAPEUTIC THINKING

One of our priorities this year is to support children to regulate their behaviour. This month's tip: **How to enjoy a great summer as a family**: The summer break is quickly approaching! This is a great opportunity to build memories together and to connect with your children. The key is to find the balance between having just enough activity without over-scheduling your days. Also be aware that transitions take time: after a year of built-up stress or tension from school, your child may decompress into a meltdown or a few tantrums before she can fully settle into a new rhythm.

How can parents help?

Find some time every day to have some fun with your child: real belly laughs and some safe rough and tumble together are great decompressors. Remember that he will also still need some structure: make sure his day/week has a shape and a routine so that he knows what to expect. It is equally as important for children to have some downtime once in a while so that they can practice getting creative with their time: start making a 'boredom buster jar' with ideas of things they can do when they feel bored. Limit technology use to certain times of the day. And why not reflect back on the summer at the end of August by either making a photo album or drawing pictures of your favourite memories in a book?

SURVEY: BULLYING DEFINTION

In our recent Parent and Pupil survey, bullying was raised as a concern by some. So, the Junior Leadership Team (JLT) have come up with a clear definition for bullying:

"Bullying is when someone repeatedly (over and over again) hurts or makes fun of another person on purpose. It can happen through words, actions, or even online." They will make these into posters and have created a presentation and videos with role-plays, (shared on the website, before the end of term).


Reception

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

FENABLEDSCAN

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

Artificial intelligence (AI) is quickly becoming a widely used tool, with lots of positive applications being discussed and developed. Sadly, however, as with most technology tools, there are those who will seek to use it for malicious and dishonest practices, with children and other vulnerable groups particularly at risk.

PHISHING EMAILS: BETTER & QUICKER

Phishing scams – emails designed to trick people into handing over login details or money – are not new, and do not rely on Al; however, Al has made them far more dangerous. Criminals can now generate highly convincing emails at speed, harder to spot, especially for young people who may not yet know what to look out for.


ONLINE MARKETPLACE

Online marketplaces are now a common way to buy and sell everything, from second-hand clothes to cars. Criminals are exploiting this by using AI to

password-based logins. One such example was the use of Al deepfake audio as part of a fake kidnapping scam: the criminals used an Al voice clone of a 15-year-old to convince her parents she had been

Guardian reported a scam targeting young people with promises of quick cash, posing as TikTok staff.

accompanied with realistic fake photos and videos, which makes it easier for criminals to build trust with young people – among other things, this can lead to fraud or sextortion. In 2024, the NCA's CEOP Safety Centre received 380 reports of sextortion. Alarmingly, in the first five months alone, police received an average of 117 monthly reports involving under-18s, showing how serious and targeted this threat has

Advice for Parents & Educators

THINK CRITICALLY

The key to addressing the increasing growth of AI-enabled scams is to think critically and show caution. Inform children that if something is too good to be true, then it probably is. Encourage them to stop and carefully consider what they are seeing and reading before taking any action. For example, if a social media post expresses urgency, proceed with caution; if content seems unusual, ev from a known person, it may be that their account has been hacked.

USE TRUSTWORTHY SITES AND SERVICES

Online marketplaces are useful when buying and selling items; however, where possible, encourage children to use reputable companies and their online shopping sites. These companies are likely to have more sophisticated cyber-security safeguards in place, underpinned by consumer legislation, enabling them to control how products and services are displayed and traded on their sites.

SEEK TO VERIFY

Criminals may breach an influencer's account or spread misinformation and fake content; however, their approach will generally be limited to a single account, site or service. Where possible, show children how to verify information to check its legitimacy before proceeding. Small actions, such as phoning the person who is the subject of a suspicious email, or checking content via an individual or company website or social media sites can make the difference. The greater the risk, the more effort we should expend to confirm whether the information presented is true or false.

REPORT IT

As the sophistication of scams increases, the likelihood of being tricked by them also increases, especially when not paying attention or acting quickly. It is important that young people know how to report incidents as they happen. Show children how to report their concerns to the social media site, Action Fraud, banks, and other individuals or organisations linked or involved. If you are unsure of the most effective reporting channel, contact Action Fraud.
